The 52nd Annual CAIS/ACSI Conference is set to take place online from June 4-7, 2024 and invites a wide range of submissions under the LIS disciplinary umbrella, including papers, lightning talks, and panels. In line with the leap year, this year's theme is "Leaps & Stumbles," reflecting the dynamic and often unpredictable journey of research. The focus is on embracing the challenges and triumphs in information science research, from groundbreaking "Quantum Leaps" to the candid sharing and "Leaps of Faith" in ongoing projects.

The conference remains committed to inclusivity, offering a free and open access platform to all participants to present their research, engage in meaningful discussions, and contribute to the evolving landscape of information science. Proposals in English and French are invited from presenters in Canada and beyond, including scholars, students, and practitioners. Deadlines

The submission deadline for all proposals is February 5th, 2024, midnight Pacific Time. Initial submissions should be scrubbed of identifying information for double-blind peer review.

Authors will be notified no later than **March 15, 2024**. Final versions must be submitted no later than April 30, 2024, and will then be published on the conference website and in the conference proceedings.

As always, we are especially looking forward to our Doctoral / Master's Student Research Forum! The Forum's goal is to provide graduate students with an opportunity to present and discuss their research project, get feedback from senior researchers, and make connections with other students. Students at any stage of their graduate program are invited to submit to the Forum. Please be prepared to present informally on an aspect of your research for 5-10 minutes, which will be followed by discussion. More details will be provided upon acceptance.

/ CJILS update

About the latest CJILS issue

The [latest CJILS issue](#) (Volume 46, Issue 2) is now complete! It features the first editorial of our new editor-in-chief, Philippe Mongeon, as well as five articles. Two articles address AI-related topics. Michael Ridley explores Spotify users' everyday experience with the platform's recommender systems and draws folk theories that can reinforce, challenge, and augment the principles of human-centred explainable AI (HCXAI). Siham Alaoui discusses the implications of AI for records management. Two articles relate to the accessibility and circulation of scholarly outputs. Poppy Riddle and co-authors investigate the state of green open access in Canadian universities, focusing on institutional policies and repositories and how they are used for self-archiving peer-reviewed work. Rémi Toupin and colleagues propose a storytelling approach to analyze the circulation of articles on Twitter (now X). Philippe Mongeon and colleagues map the Canadian LIS research landscape, highlighting the diversity of the field as a whole and how each of the eight academic units offering ALA-accredited degrees contributes to the mosaic of Canadian LIS scholarship. We hope you enjoy reading the works in this latest issue and that you will consider CJILS, our diamond open access journal, as a publishing venue for your future work!

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This year, we are happy to be working with Julia Bullard and Hannah Turner from the UBC iSchool to publish a special issue titled “Knowledge Organization and Nations” (see the call for paper [here](#)).
